Dear Parents/Carers,

As we reach the end of the spring term, I would like to share with you some of the highlights of 2024 so far.

As you are aware a significant change took place for us this month as on Friday 1st March as we academised and became part of **Thrive Education Partnership**. We are excited by the support and collaborative opportunities this will bring for us with the focus on improving outcomes for our students.

You will know from local and national newspapers that **attendance** across the country is a cause for concern. The Government & DfE are quite rightly troubled by this as poor attendance does impact on the success students experience as learners. The expectations are that students are in school for at least 95% of the year, anything below that is a cause for concern and if attendance falls below 90% then a student is classed as being persistently absent. We understand that many of our students have complicated health issues that affect their ability to attend. However, I would like to remind parents that if a child has a medical appointment they are expected to attend school for part of the day unless the appointment is taking place outside Coventry.

In January the whole academy was treated to a performance from **M&M Theatrical Productions**; the show this year was **Beauty and the Beast.** It was complete with costume and scenery changes, up to date music so all could join in and dance and sing along. Everyone in the audience had a great afternoon. Lots of fun and high energy from all. The performance was sponsored for school by the charity Happy Days so a big thank you to them.

There have of course been many other community trips that students have taken part in; **Excel swimming** sessions, visits to the **Transport Museum**, trips to the **cinema**, **sporting competitions** along with visits to places in the local area.
